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CEO's REPORT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC



Developing Indigenous Resources-INDIA anticipated the entry of the virus into India way before its onset in 2020. Knowing the origin country, China's close proximity to our homeland we were vigilant in our workings. The medical program of DIR-INDIA was enhanced on both fronts of academics, training and committee meetings from 21st January 2020 in the slums of Janta colony, Safeda Colony and our adopted village, Dhanas. Our staff covered a population of nearly 20,000 in an awareness campaign teaching them the safety precautions of the Covid-19 virus. The Health Promoters, who are the local residents of the slum as well as the rest of the population residing in the same area, were well educated about the virus and its prevention. We proudly confirm that during the trying times of the pandemic we witnessed not even a single case of Covid-19 due to this stringent screening process. The medical team made charts and posters on

Coronavirus and held Committee meetings in each and every area of the slum, including Dhanas, to generate awareness and prevention of the disease amongst the slum residents. As mentioned earlier we did not contact a single case of Covid-19 in our adopted area, all residents during the lockdown ensured that no trespassers entered their lane or gave into false information passed down by faulty resources.

The pace with which Coronavirus was spreading all over the world was like a wildfire. In India, the first case of





Coronavirus was reported on 31st January 2020 in Kerala, a student who came from Wuhan, China. The first case of Covid-19 reported in Chandigarh on 19th March 2020. The state of Punjab, where our office resides, announced lockdown on 20th March 2020 while the nationwide lockdown was announced on 24th March 2020 up till 3rd May 2020. The spread of virus in India too was pretty quick but, the number of cases reported in southern states of the country was the highest.





DIR-INDIA has been running the Medical program on mother care and child health since December 2005. Basic knowledge on health and hygiene, since its foundation has been known amongst most of the permanent residents as of today. Janta and Safeda Colony's slum residents are majority migrant laborers out of which 173 families used to earn their livelihood on a daily basis. Maximum pregnant mothers and malnourished children were caught out of this very area.

All the male members of Janta Colony and Safeda Colony lost their jobs during this pandemic period due to the initial no contact lockdown. The DIR-India office, however, did not shut down. Ours was the only organization which kept working in tricity throughout the dark period of 2020-2021. Our team risked their lives to serve the underprivileged community and ensured that not a single member of the family in a slum of 15,000 slept with a hungry stomach.





We are grateful to our President Ms. Shashi Prabha, IPS Additional DG Police, who gave police protection to our field staff as many miscreants from other areas often attacked the DIR office for procuring groceries.











During working hours besides the medical program we trained our staff in computers for data entry so that they all could create a soft copy of the growth charts they had been making. This did not only push for a quicker analysis, but this readily available data, that could potentially be accessed with the ease of the wireless network, could be used for research purposes by Public Health Doctors or PhD students in India or any other part of the World.

Our Health Promoters were given a special training course in Fashion designing and tailoring by the Fashion Designing department of Panjab University. This professional training on stitching helped the DIR staff in making masks, napkins, scrunchies, bags and many other products which were sold in exhibitions to raise funds for the tailoring department of DIR-India.

DIR-India created job opportunities for *Basti* women by introducing Rozgaar Hamara Vyapaar. Mr. Ravinder Jain and Rani Jain donated an Electric Masala grinding machine, weighing scale and sealing machine. The couple financially assisted DIR to start the project to generate employment for women of Janta Colony.


The schools were closed so DIR-INDIA started a Distance Learning Program where SWAD School Teachers were trained in online skills to take Hindi classes for children of Indian parents working in Europe and USA.

MEDICAL CLASSES:

WHO declared the Coronavirus to be a global pandemic on 30th January 2020. On that very day, the first case of Coronavirus was reported in India - a student from Kerala who had come from China. To make the population aware of the COVID-19 was the need of the hour. DIR-India started classes on Coronavirus for Health Promoters. Frequent committee meetings were held, both in Janta Colony and Dhanas, to educate the Basti people and make them aware of the deadly virus which had already taken so many lives in Wuhan, China. As well as making the community aware of the spread of COVID-19 to other countries across the globe, and killing people in millions. These corrective steps were taken to sensitize the community.

Health Promoters made charts and posters on the COVID-19 Pandemic, to give a photographic image of the disease, which made a deeper impact on the Basti crowd. Emphasis was laid on the prevention of the disease by educating them on the importance of repeatedly hand washing, covering the mouth and nose by wearing masks in public places and maintaining a social distance of minimum six. As we know, COVID-19 can live on steel and plastic surfaces for up to 72 hours and in the air for half an hour to three hours. The main cause of the spread of the virus is through direct contact with infected people.

Medical topics covered by Public health doctors during COVID-19 Pandemic were:

- Coronavirus: Mode of transmission, signs and symptoms, prevention
- Malaria
- Dengue
- Crimean Congo Hemorrhagic Fever
- Fetal development in each trimester of pregnancy
- Ectopic pregnancy
- Scabies
- Preeclampsia
- Cancer and its types like; lung cancer, oral cancer, breast cancer along with video presentation of self-examination to generate awareness
- Cervical cancer
- Menstrual cycle and menopause
- Dental caries
- Viral hepatitis
- Typhoid and
- Anemia

The DIR-India team had started the routine work of weighing children under five years of age to check on their health status in the month of June. The weight recording of each child was done in the office by calling the families at different times. Senior staff and HP's had followed the standard guidelines of all safety precautions of Covid-19. Unfortunately, the first case of Covid-19 was reported from Janta Colony, Nayagaon on 12th June 2020. Both husband and wife were positive, followed by two more positive cases on 14th June 2020. The cases in Janta Colony had forced us to stop this weight recording of kids until Nayagaon was declared a safe zone.


MENSTRUALHYGIENE OF JANTA

COLONY:


- In November 2017, after Dr. Asha Katoch took over as CEO of DIR-India, a lot of female patients came up with a history of vaginal infections.
- Poor menstrual hygiene was a common cause of infection. This motivated the medical team of DIR-India to do a study on personal hygiene; vaginal infection was found to be the common cause and this motivated the DIR-I team to find a solution to this agony. Health Promoters did a door to door survey on the personal hygiene of each woman in their respective area of Janta Colony, including menstrual hygiene.
- DIR-India's medical team started an aggressive campaign and awareness program for young girls and women, educating them on different ways to maintain personal hygiene. There is a graph display of statistics of February 2018 as a reference where the majority of women were using rags and cloth.
- Detailed Evaluation of Menstrual Hygiene was once again done after DIR-India started sale of sanitary napkins at a nominal rate in 2019 and this survey was again done in July 2020.
- Graph display of statistics, will explain the awareness and growth of female gender, residing in Janta Colony. Women today in this Basti have risen from sheer ignorance since 2006. Vaginal infection is not a common issue today. Majority of the ladies are aware of common ailments and learnt the skill of prevention of common diseases.
- We are thankful and grateful to Mr.Harshvardhan Jain who has been donating Sanitary Napkins worth Rs 65,000/- (Rupees Sixty Five thousand only) to DIR-India every year since February2019. Mr. Harshvardhan has an equal role to play to achieve this mission of DIR-India, in bringing this growth, as most of the women who are using these napkins are relieved of this pain and agony of infection. Menstrual Hygiene is another success of the Medical program of DIR-India today.





Miss Saloni Jain, Assistant Professor from DAV College, Chandigarh came to seek help for her research paper on a study of Micronutrient deficiency amongst adolescent girls living in the slum. She interviewed 65 girls within the age groups of 17 years to 19 years. Their hemoglobin levels were checked by Laboratory Technicians to assess the health and nutrient status of each participant







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NUTRITION CLASSES:

Our past history with global pandemics strongly suggests that nutritional status has important implications on population health even decades after the crisis is curbed. Nutrition plays a very important role when it comes to building our body's immunity which played an important role in the fight against the Covid-19 pandemic. The prevalence of malnutrition was 42% in patients hospitalized with COVID-19.

- Immunity boosting diet
- Cholesterol
- Trans fats
- Thyroid disease and diet for healthy thyroid
- Peptic Ulcer



SOCIOLOGY CLASSES:

Rohan from Sociology department joined DIR India in the month of October during COVID19 era.

He took classes on sociology, impact of sociology on urban slums and the topics included:

- caste system
- dowry system
- child marriage
- education of rights and awareness as per Indian laws

The rapid urbanization in conjugation with industrialization has resulted in the slums. These slums give rise to many problems in the urban areas. The major problems of slums in India are as follows:-

- Shortage of space
- Prone to natural and man-made hazards: As in slums, houses are crammed in a little space; they are often prone to dangerous hazards like floods, water logging, fire etc.
 Health hazards: The poor living condition in slums affects the health of people mentally and physically. Water contamination cause disease like blood dysentery, diarrhea, malaria, typhoid, jaundice etc.
- Social problems: Socially, slums remain isolated from the rest of the urban society and exhibit pathological social symptoms like drug abuse, alcoholism, crime, vandalism and other deviant behavior. The lack of integration of slum inhabitants into urban life reflects both, the lack of ability and culture barriers.




NUTRITIONAL DEMONSTRATIONS:

Every third Tuesday of the month, DIR India's Dietitians conduct a demonstration class for Health promoters and the Slum community on Low-cost High-Calorie High Protein Diet.

DIR Nutritionists demonstrate to the HPs a recipe for a nutritious meal that can be made with ingredients available in the basti, which costs no more than 2 rupees (US 5 cents) per serving. In turn, HPs give cooking classes in their assigned zones to teach the mothers. The program is very popular and parents recognize the link to healthier growth on their children's weight charts.

This year consisted of following recipes:

- MAY: Coconut laddu
- **JUNE**: Poha Cutlet
- JULY: Stuffed and steamed suji balls
- <u>AUGUST</u>: Steamed and fried rice cutlets (Chawal ka farah)
- **SEPTEMBER**: Instant suji tawa pizza
- OCTOBER: Colorful instant rava idlis
- **NOVEMBER**: Nutri-Case
- **DECEMBER**: Peanut Chikki
- <u>JANUARY</u>: Deep fried Indian style pancakes
- <u>FEBRUARY</u>: Vegetables stuffed khandvi



COMPUTER AND DATA ENTRY CLASSES:

On 4th May 2020, the government ended the lockdown in the country. With hesitation and fear in mind, some of the government offices and a few private offices took the bold step of starting their work schedules. DIR-India's office was one of them. Nayagaon was a hotspot for Covid19, as there were active cases reported in this area, but the senior staff managed to seek entry into Janta Colony for social reasons. It was challenging and high risk for all of us, but welfare responsibilities gave courage to deal with these issues at this hour of crisis. The computer classes had become more active, along with academics and tailoring programs. DIR-India started basic training in computers for our Health Promoters. It was challenging for some and depressing for a few as many of the HP's did not know how to hold a mouse and simultaneously type on the keyboard. Today, it is heartening to see our HP's with a big smile on their faces, as they have learnt the skill of updating the weight records of each child on their Growth Charts. As of date, all records of children under five years of age, pregnant mothers and NIPP kids are maintained in their respective folders. Data entry operator took regular computer classes and monitored the work of each HP. This data is stored on USB drives and also uploaded into our Google drive by senior staff at the end of the day.



INCOME GENERATION PROGRAM:

The tailoring program had become more active during COVID-19 pandemic era. Reusable masks were made and sold at affordable prices. The aim of the mask making was to help the community, generate revenue and give employment to Basti women. Three new Singer sewing machines were purchased to engage more women. These sewing machines were financed by Mrs.Rani Jain. We are grateful to Rani Jain for her generosity at this hour of need. Mrs. Rani Jain donated three new sewing machines, two hand machines and one foot-operated machine. This upgraded the Tailoring Section of DIR-India, along with the new carpet for women to be comfortable while stitching. The carpet was donated by Mr. Sood.

The prime agenda of DIR-India is to generate revenue and to give employment to Basti women during this tough period of unemployment. DIR-I started making Reusable and Washable Masks with different shapes, styles and sizes as per Government specification.

Some of the items which were made during COVID PANDEMIC included:

- washable & reusable 3-PLY cotton masks
- 2-PLY cotton masks
- Cotton straps masks
- wine bags
- tiffin carrier bags
- laptop bags
- keyboard & computer monitor covers
- wall hangings
- aprons



- Our team produced a variety of masks which served as an income generating asset, a way to empower women and be able to get independent financially for some extent which will add to the future earnings and also to contribute our efforts in order to combat this merciless pandemic.
- Institute of Fashion Technology And Vocational Development of Panjab University collaborated with DIR-India for a professional advance training program in tailoring. This was called "Project TIGR2ESS "which was funded by Cambridge University via Panjab University Administration. It lasted for a 6 months training program for Basti women. This helped in improving the tailoring skills to make DIR-India more competent in stitching and designing.

- DIR-India's women empowerment tailoring program required up-gradation with new automatic computerized sewing machines. Usha Sewing Machine Manufacturing Company organized two demo workshops in the DIR Tailoring room which was attended by the Health Promoters. We are grateful to Mr.Maninder Singh who sent his two trainers from Usha Sewing Machine Company, Mr.Rohit and Mr. Varun for the demonstration. Our team was trained in different types of stitches and sewing skills on Hi Tech Sewing Machines which the organization is expected to get on donation by well-wishers of DIRINDIA.
- On 8th March 2021, International Women Day was celebrated in the DIR-INDIA office. Enactus student body along with Enactus Head Prof. Seema Kapoor and Prof.Anu Gupta and Manager from Usha International Sewing Machine graced the occasion by inaugurating the two Hi-Tech Usha Machine donated by Versatile Textile Ltd. Our special thanks to Prof.Seema Kapoor and Enactus Team for upgrading our tailoring program.
- Prof. Anu Gupta and Annee from the Fashion and Textile designing Department of Panjab University gave
 an advanced training program in designing and tailoring for our Health Promoters and Santosh Kumari, our
 Tailoring teacher to promote and improve the stitching and designing skills of DIR Team. Our team was
 awarded with certificates on compilation of 6 month course. These classes have enhanced the professional
 competency in creative and innovative art amongst the DIR-INDIA team.



EVENTS AND NEW PROJECTS INTRODUCED IN COVID ERA:

• From 30th March 2020, DIR India worked actively in providing groceries to all those under-privileged communities of Adarsh Nagar, most of who were daily wagers and had lost their jobs, their very sole source of earning making their survival uncertain due to the calamities' condition of scarcity.

MAY EVENTS:

- On 4th May 2020, the government ended the lockdown in the country. Nayagaon was a hotspot for Covid19, as there were active cases reported in this area, however, the senior staff managed to seek entry into
 Janta Colony for social reasons. Our tailoring program, in fact had become more active than its prelockdown state due to the growing need for masks. This along with academics and computer classes soon
 resumed. Reusable masks were stitched by our ladies and sold at affordable prices. This program of mask
 creation continued to help the community, generate revenue and give employment to *basti* women. Thus,
 seeing the influx, three new Singer sewing machines were purchased to engage more women into the given
 programme. These sewing machines were financed by Rani Jain, for which we applaud her generosity, as
 she became such an anchor at the hour of need. This upgraded the Tailoring Section of DIR-India. Along
 with this, Mr. Sood was incredibly swift in helping us procure a new carpet for women to undertake the
 task more comfortably.
- The prime agenda of DIR-India was to generate revenue and to give employment to Basti women during that tough period of unemployment. DIR-India started making Reusable and Washable Masks with different shapes, styles and sizes as per Government specification.



JUNE EVENTS:

- On 30th June 2020, DIR-India vacated the sector 11office of Chandigarh and the entire administrative wing was reorganized in the Basti building. We are grateful to Mr.Ajit Singh and Mr. Lalit Jain who helped us in constructing a big store room on the rooftop of the Basti building to accommodate the surplus furniture and allied items. Developing Indigenous Resources India now has one office, where all four projects are controlled and run under one roof. This has enhanced our efficiency.
- On 21st June 2020, the "THE INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY", PEP TURF owned by Maj. Manoj Malhotra, his son Aryaman and a few other companies joined hands to raise funds for DIR-India, which were donated directly to DIR's instamojo account. We are extremely grateful to Maj. Manoj and Aryaman who are the main architects behind this noble cause of "Defeat hunger".
- In the second week of June, the medical team started weighing the children in our SWAD school classrooms, with proper social distancing, and taking all precautions against the virus.
- 90 packages of groceries were donated by the Can & Will Foundation, which assisted DIR-I to take care of malnourished children and families of the Basti.
- In addition to the above ration distribution, through personal liaison with the Divisional Commissioner and Administrative wing of the Punjab Government, grocery packages were provided to 254 families of Janta Colony, which included our Health Promoters, teachers, and two maids.











JULY EVENTS:

- DIR-India was granted permission to have 8KV triple phase power supply.
- We are extremely thankful to Colonel Suraj Prakash for financing the purchase of three new computers with latest technology and double tubular battery inverter of Luminous company (as power back up) to make our office work smooth and without any hindrance.
- Col.Suraj Prakash did the virtual inauguration of Suraj Admin Office this month as he was in Austin, USA that day.
- Colonel LJS Gill, who makes frequent visits to our office, realized the need of making DIR-India's dedicated team more comfortable. He donated three Air Conditioners with stabilizers to DIR-India. We admire his devotion towards the cause that he personally under his own supervision got the three AC's fitted fully functional which made the atmosphere cool and comfortable in hot, wet and sticky climate.
- CCTV of six cameras had been installed for DIR-India's safety and security of the electronics and property. This helps the CEO in a complete picture of all the functioning and movement within the premises of the organization.
- DIR-India signed an MOU with the Ma Foundation run by Geeta Gopalkrishanan. The Ma foundation will be helping DIR-I with funds to feed 200 needy families with grocery items for two months.
- Medical team of DIR-India did study on the Menstrual Hygiene of Basti women in July.
- The Enactus Team of Panjab University donated masks for Basti families. They had been helping
- and assisting DIR-I by donating 100 masks for the safety and security of our health
- promoters when they were weighing children and distributing ration kits in the field or interacting with the people of Basti.



AUGUST EVENTS:

- Tata Consumer Products Limited donated 250 KG Masoor Dal (Lentils) and 250 KG TATA Salt.
- Enactus Team also donated 100 face shields and 61 face masks made in the Garment Factory for protection and safety of the DIR-India Team.
- Our special thanks to Mr. Harshvardhan and Meenakshi Jain for feeding 130 children and families with duly packed cooked meals. Distribution was done on 13th August 2020 at DIR-India Office premises by observing all COVID-19 Pandemic safety measures.
- Connect Telecommunication Services had laid a fiber-optic cable network supply in Nayagaon. DIR-INDIA was one of the first customers who have been given broadband service with good internet speed. Working in the Basti office has become smooth and convenient.
- OORJAA donated 100 packets of milk and 288 Kinder Joy chocolates for children of Janta Colony on 20 August.
- DIR India joined hands with **Social Substance along with Indian Creative Unity** to spread the awareness about the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic through the Masterpiece of Art Abstract Painting. DIR staff carried the information to thousands of people of Nayagaon over the period via online and offline mode of information dissemination.

- 13 Children of Kindergarten from SWAD School got admission in Government Model School Chandigarh.
- The garbage dump in the adjoining plot of our Main office in the basti had been converted into a beautiful garden. We are grateful to Mr. Sood who donated flower pots and a variety of plants. Mr. Sood is our Horticulture advisor who is frequently consulted on the type of plantation to be done which requires minimum maintenance but adds beauty and keeps the environment healthy.



OCTOBER EVENTS:

- Can & Will Foundation donated 950 packs of Milk and Glucose biscuits. We are indebted to all donors for their endowment which benefited all kids and pregnant women who come to DIR-India for their health checkup were given those packets of happiness as parting gifts.
- Swachh Bharat Abhiyan is the nationwide drive. DIR-India and Oorjaa organization doled out steel dustbin to 145 families of Janta Colony. It was a motivation incentive to change the outlook of the residents of the basti and guide them to keep the environment clean and healthy for the good living standard.
- Dr. Madhu Khullar financed the cost of books for all four students who got admission in St. Stephens School this year.
- Mr. Ravinder Jain and Mrs.Rani Jain, a business family, visited DIR-India's Basti office. They both were galvanized by the functioning of the organization. They donated money for feeding 130 children of Basti on 29th October. A grand feast was cooked by a professional Cook along with assistance offered by the entire team of DIR-India. The food was delicious as it was cooked with great devotion by the dedicated volunteers.



NOVEMBER EVENTS:

• Ms. Saloni Jain, Assistant Professor from DAV College, Chandigarh came to seek help for her research paper on a study of "Micronutrient deficiency amongst adolescent girls" living in the slum. She interviewed 65 girls in the age group of 17 years to 19 years. Hemoglobin levels were checked by Laboratory Technicians to assess the health and nutrient status of each participant.


