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CEO'S REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

DIR-INDIA's main project is a medical program. The efforts of the Health Promoters and senior staff have always been to improve the health status of children under 5 years of age. Fortunately, there is a drop in the total number of red zone children. The credit goes to the medical team as they have worked hard in monitoring each child. In addition along with food, supplements were personally given to each child under direct supervision.

The financial support by new donors helped us in making the meals enriched with more butter and dry fruits thus improving the standard of food which children relished.

One senior staff and one Health Promoter are on rotational duty to supervise the cooking. Food is tasted by the CEO before the distribution starts. Personal monitoring of the program makes the entire system more efficient and result-oriented.

It is seen that the percentage of malnourished children has come down.

The floating population in the Janta colony is the main reason why children under 5 years of age are mostly malnourished, which adds up to the list of red zone children.

The women empowerment tailoring program is doing well. We offer our sincere thanks to Ms Geetanjali, CSR Head of Versatile Textile Mills who is considering helping and supporting DIR-INDIA's tailoring program. The tailoring team has made 1200 reusable sanitary napkins. On 2nd November 2021, a special function was organized in DIR-INDIA; sanitary pads (35 sets) were sold at a subsidized rate. The main agenda behind this is to promote reusable sanitary napkins and discourage the use of disposable napkins to avoid environmental pollution. These sanitary napkins are stitched by Basti girls under the guidance and expert advice of Versatile Industry to conform to very high-quality standards and supervised by our Tailoring team.

Diwali was celebrated in a traditional manner on 3 November. For the first time, the DIR building was decorated with its own lighting arrangements and a fresh set of 3 DIR banners visible from three directions were fixed. The celebrations were held on the ground floor of the building with SWAD kids and the entire DIR team.

Mental Health is another factor that plays a major role in the health of poor people. Mr. Aditya Varma and Dr Gurpreet Singh of Pushpanjali Trust of Mental health visited DIR on 10 & 18 November to conduct regular classes for the needy in Basti. Mr. Gurpreet conducted a class on Mental Health. This is helping the Health Promoters, how to deal with mental health issues. In Janta Colony, we have 18 patients who are suffering from mental illness. Gurpreet Singh accompanies the Health promoter to do field visits in Janta Colony to assess the mental state of people residing in the adopted area.

On 16th November 2021 Ms Pihoo Pathania joined DIR India on a volunteer basis to offer her services in the field of Media projection and editing.

Two senior army officers' wives Mrs. Jatinder Sandhu and Mrs. Rama Dhodi visited DIR on 17th November 2021. Mrs. Jatinder Sandhu was so impressed by the work of the organization that she adopted one child for the NIPP program, and promised to visit again.

On the 7th of every month, grocery items are distributed to the underprivileged families.

St Stephen School reopened and 8 children joined in November, our Tata Sumo vehicle is once again being used productively.

Swad school children are the life of DIR-INDIA. We have strength of 55 children in November and we are hopeful that the strength of school will increase as more parents are making inquiries about the school.







MEDICAL TRAINING



In the medical program, the academic classes were taken by Dr Asha. The topic was on HORMONES for health promoters. The medical training is given in a simple and practical way supported by common examples to make them understand the concept.

Hormones are chemical messengers that are secreted directly into the blood, which carries them to organs and tissues of the body to exert their functions. Hormones regulate growth, sex drive, sexual development, reproduction, sexual function and metabolism. Medical classes are taken in a simple language so that during committee meetings this knowledge is driven to all mothers in the Basti.

NUTRITION TRAINING

Dietitian Swati took a nutrition class on FATS. A small amount of fat is an essential part of a healthy, balanced diet. Fat is a source of essential fatty acids, which the body cannot make itself. Fat helps the body absorb vitamin A, vitamin D and vitamin E. These vitamins are fat-soluble, which means they can only be absorbed with the help of fats.

Subtopics like LDL (low-density lipoproteins), HDL (high-density lipoproteins), VLDL (very low-density lipoproteins), Saturated and unsaturated fats, Trans fats and how they are harmful to us, the importance of Monounsaturated Fatty Acids and Polyunsaturated Fatty Acids were covered under it.



NUTRITION DEMONSTRATION





This month's nutrition demonstration was conducted on Children's special **DONUTS**!! Our team of health promoters in charge of this month's demonstration under the guidance of a Dietitian, made this recipe without the use of an oven but by deep-frying the dough in cooking oil and garnishing the product with chocolates and nuts. The main motive to make this dish without a microwave or oven was to guide basti women that anything can be made healthy and attractive in basic kitchen utensils too with the limited supply of food items present in the kitchen.


- The weight of 33 children sponsored in our NIPP Program has been recorded to keep up the child's progress report to Donors every month.


