MEDICAL TRAINING

In India, July is wet and sultry, due to the onset of the monsoon across India. This season nurtures Vector borne and waterborne diseases like malaria, dengue, chikungunya, jaundice, typhoid, hepatitis and gastroenteritis.

In the slums, stagnant water in coolers, Drums and water cisterns, buckets, decorative fountains, broken water meters, animal drinking bowls, portable pools (not in use), potted plants, open or unsealed septic tanks are breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

Most of these diseases can be prevented. The Medical Team of DIR INDIA holds committee meetings to generate awareness and demonstrate preventive methods on water borne diseases.





NUTRITION TRAINING

Monsoon weather brings respite from the heat, but at the same time it invites a number of illnesses. Digestive issues are more common during the rainy season as metabolism becomes sluggish and one may face problems such as gas, acidity, bloating, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, cramping, constipation, gastritis, and gut sensitivity issues.

Drinking water from other sources apart from sealed bottles and water purifiers can make us suffer from diarrhea. Gastroenteritis or stomach bug or stomach flu, also known as inflammation (irritation) of your intestines is seen in this season. Spicy and dry foods must be avoided in monsoon, and that makes pakoras a part of it. This is because it is difficult to digest deep-fried foods and the digestive system is already at its low during the monsoons.

The dampness and dirt in green leafy vegetables make them more prone to getting contaminated; instead one can go for bitter gourd, ghiya, tori, eggplant.

Internal body heat makes the body's digestive system sluggish, consequently affecting immunity. Therefore, an essential monsoon diet tip is to avoid foods that aggravate body heat and indulge in light, calming foods.

Nutritional training included these agendas in academic and committee meetings for public awareness. The academics included class on the importance of macronutrients, glycemic load, glycemic index, hyperglycemia, diet in dehydration and fluid imbalance.

CHILD ACTIVIST PROGRAM

This month 20 students participated in the Child Activist Programme (CAP) where a team of health promoters taught them about the importance of Personal Hygiene, Hand Washing and Fever.

Hand hygiene included 6 steps of hand wash and personal hygiene.

Different games and activities were also included in the programme like musical chair, kabaddi, kho-kho and Rubik cube puzzle.

Aim of the CAP is to generate leadership qualities, build team spirit and friendship amongst the children.

Education through games and activities helps in physical and mental development. It also helps in making them interested in generating awareness in their neighborhood.





HOMEOPATHIC CAMP:

This month Homeopathy team of 2 Doctors and Paramedical staff from Homeopathic Medical College and Hospital of sector 26, Chandigarh held 3 camps.

• TUITION CLASSES:



Evening Tuition classes are held every day for Basti children as students need extra guidance with regards to their examinations. The standard of teaching is excellent, as each child gets individual attention. The tuition fee is nominal and we are looking for donors who can help the underprivileged girls. Monthly fees for computer classes are Rs 400 only.

In the month of July, total strength of basti students for tuition classes was 6.

• COMPUTER CLASSES:

The standard of teaching and training is excellent, as each child gets individual attention. We have a list of Basti girls who are keen to learn computer skills but due to financial constraints, keeps them restricted to grow in life. Monthly fees for computer classes are Rs 500 only. The fee is nominal and we are looking for donors who can help the underprivileged girls for this training program so that the job opportunity for them becomes easy in shopping stores in and around Chandigarh In the month of July, the total strength of basti students was 9.
