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CEO'S REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

DIR India has been working in Janta Colony for the last 17 years. 90% residents are aware of health issues and family planning. Socioeconomic status of the majority of the families has improved.

Janta Colony and Safeda Colony in 2010 were included in District SAS Nagar and it is under the care of Mohali Municipality. It is heartening for DIR INDIA to see the growth of Janta Colony from slums to a partially developed area after its inclusion in the municipality of Mohali ,Punjab.

In this area ,10% of the floating population, who are living on rent, need DIR INDIA's Medical team's constant services. It is interesting to know that the Health Promoters have earned a good reputation as far as medical and nutrition knowledge is concerned. The trust and faith which the local residents have on our Health Promoters and the medical team, that DIR India is like medical consultants giving advice to residents as and when needed.

DIR decided to reduce the number of total population in Janta Colony & Safeda colony to 10,000, and adopt the population in Dhanas from 5000 to 10,000.





In October 2019 DIR India did a survey of 17 blocks of Dhanas, which comes under the administration of Chandigarh (Union Territory). The Medical Team adopted a population of 5000 approximately for the Medical Project, but due to COVID-19 the project had to be discontinued in March 2020.

In 2023, after two years the survey was done again in the 17 blocks to maintain the count of 5000 population to ensure the current statistics of children under 5 years of age, Pregnant mothers and lactating mothers in these blocks.



Initially we worked on 5000 population and from December 2023 we have plans to increase population to 10,000 so that the total population will remain 20,000.

In November ,Dr.Shalini visited DIR INDIA.. She accompanied the Health Promoters to Dhanas and confirmed to adopt 5000 more population in Dhanas itself instead of looking for a new area.

DIR INDIA will start the survey of new blocks from December 2023 in Dhanas to make the total strength of 10,000 population of MEDICAL PROJECT. In Dhanas, the awareness and medical knowledge on prevention of diseases is lacking in this area.

Tailoring department of DIR India earned some revenue by selling its products in two exhibitions hosted by DAV College and Tagore Theatre, Chandigarh.

MEDICAL TRAINING

Topics Assigned

- 1. Tuberculosis
- 2. Dental caries and hygiene
- 3. Autism

This Month we took Tuberculosis disease in medical class .There are still cases of tuberculosis, but due to the disease's stigma, many individuals do not disclose it if they are aware of it. As a result, we consider this a major issue because it is a communicable disease, so we started classes on Tuberculosis for our new team of health workers this month.We trained our health promoter on the symptoms, causes, and diagnosis of tuberculosis which they share with local people during the committee meetings in simple language.

Rest of the academic topics were repeated to refresh the knowledge of Health Promoters .



The preventive measures listed below were all put into place during committee meetings to spread awareness within the Nayagaon region.

- Malnutrition.
- TB.
- Dental caries and Hygiene
- Dengue and chikungunya.

NUTRITIONAL TRAINING

The main focus of our program is in maternal health and children's health due to

malnutrition. We also take care of all health issues like diabetes, hypertension, tuberculosis (TB) etc. and guide the families what type of diet to be taken during this illness. TB is a serious illness that mainly affects the lungs due to a bacteria called Mycobacterium Tuberculosis.

Malnutrition leads to decreased immunity.Poor nutrition can encourage the persistence of active tuberculosis disease, which leads to severe malnutrition.



Keeping in mind the above facts the topics covered in academics are:

- Assessment of malnutrition
- Dietary management during Tuberculosis.
- Conservation of nutrients.

NUTRITIONAL DEMONSTRATION

Nutritional Demonstration on 21st Nov 2023

Name of the Recipe - Nutritious sabudana chaat

Sabudana is easily digestible and provides rapid energy. Sabudana is a good source of calcium, iron, folate and energy. To make chaat more nutritious other ingredients added were peanut (dry roasted), boiled potato (diced), carrot (steamed), boiled peas, beetroot (chopped), capsicum (steamed), pomegranate.
