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Developing Indigenous Resources India is qualified for Tax exemption under Income Tax Act 1961 U/S 12AA. vide order no.

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DIR India's main project is on the Mother and child health program. This project has been running in Janta Colony and Safedha Colony for the last 17 years.

We replicated this project in Dhanas, adopting 5000 population residing in 17 blocks in 2019

Due to Covid - 19 Pandemic, we had to discontinue the Dhanas project.

Last year, in 2023 we did a fresh survey of the same 17 blocks in Dhanas to assess; the total number of population currently residing in these blocks.

In November 2023 on the suggestion of Dr. Shalini, we decided to adopt 5000 more population in Dhanas to make a total of 10000 population in Dhanas.

As of date, we are serving a total of 20,000 population, 10,000 in Janta Colony and 10,000 in Dhanas

We are running the Dhanas Medical Project from Janta Colony as we have not found any suitable accommodation for our office.



All the donors who have visited the organization are generous. This time the cold wave was severe in the plains. Chandigarh was badly hit. The owners of Elante Mall donated Blankets to the underprivileged community.

Mr.Sanjay Bhatia donated sweaters and socks to all the school children, DIR India's entire staff and to few underprivileged families living in Janta colony Nayagaon.

My name is Anjana and I belong to Jalandhar (Punjab). My qualification is B.A.M.S. (Bachelors of Ayurvedic Medicine and Surgery). I have passed B.A.M.S from Smt. Urmila Devi Ayurvedic Medical College, Hoshiarpur, Punjab in 2015. After completing my graduation, I started working at Dogra Paramedical Institute Hoshiarpur as Medical Officer and tutor. After that I joined Kundan Kidney Care Centre Jalandhar in 2018 and continued to work there till 2023 as a general physician where I used to provide consultation and herbal treatment to the

patients suffering from Chronic Kidney Disease including patients undergoing regular dialysis. In October 2023 I worked at ND Care Nirogam Private Limited where I gave consultation to the autistic children.

I joined DIR India as a Public Health Doctor on 11th December 2023.

I take medical classes under the guidance of Dr. Asha Ma'am as well as field visits where I monitor the fieldwork and counseling of mothers.

Outside of the organisation, I love travelling, watching movies and listening to music.

### **MEDICAL TRAINING**

### Topics Assigned

In the first month of the year, the medical training emphasis was once again based on COVID-19. The link below explains te detail of the COVID 19 victims in india. The news Papers Highlighted 15,000 fresh cases COVID-19 of between December 11th, 2024 to January 7th, 2024. The WHO report highlighted the prevalence of the JN.1 variant Which required SARS COV2 casued mild to severe respiratory illness.

The respiratory system was chosen for academics.

Dr. Anjana took classes on COVID 19, causative factors, signs and symptoms, mode of transmission, and preventive measures which includes getting wearing of mask, maintain 6 feet Distance, Frequent hand washing and vaccination.

Avoid going to Crowded places. CEO, Dr. Asha Katoch took a class on respiratory systems explained anatomy physiology and pathology of the lungs.

Moreover URTI is common amongst children in winters. In Committee meetings the preventive measures are given in simple language by field staff and senior staff.

### > NUTRITION TRAINING

In the month of January the nutrition training was focused on the:

- Importance of phytonutrients in our daily life.
- Dietary management during Covid.
- Conservation of nutrients.

Phytonutrients or antioxidants are compounds produced by plants that provide health benefits to the body. Antioxidants reduce the risk of cancer, heart disease etc. A diet rich in protein and energy plays an important role in overcoming from Covid attack.





### **NUTRITIONAL DEMONSTRATION**

Nutritional Demonstration on 18th January 2024

Name of the Recipe - Low-cost energy-rich Panjiri

Panjiri is a very good snack used during winter and after delivery. It stimulates breast milk flow, boosts immunity, keeps the mother's body warm, and provides nutrients that help fight postpartum depression. The ingredients used for preparing *panjiri* were roasted wheat flour, peanuts, kishmish, sesame seeds, Jaggery powder and desi ghee. This *panjiri* is good in taste and flavor and low in cost.






