

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CEO REPORT

The New Year 2025 started with a severe cold, but DIR India's teamwork standards are never compromised. Work continues with regular classes. Tech Mahindra's staff requested to run a Medical Project for young students and needy women, a Medical Attendant course of 6 months. In this six-month course, there are theory classes for 3 months, which were hosted by DIR from 17th December onwards. The training teachers were provided by Tech Mahindra.

The balance, Practical experience of 3 months, is done in the hospitals affiliated with Tech Mahindra. On completion of the course, a qualified Medical Attendant certificate is issued by Tech Mahindra. The DIR Medical team excelled in this course.

Dr.Mrs Santosh Sharma, a retired Professor and Head of the Department of Hindi from Punjab University, is deeply involved in social activities. She is a member of the BHARAT VIKAS PARISHAD, which is deeply involved in a social cause. The top members of this organisation came to visit DIR India. They distributed blankets to all the underprivileged women of our Basti.

The work of DIR India is well recognised by all foreign students who have done their internship in our organisation.



CEO REPORT

Andrea Sadowski worked in our organization as an Intern for 3 months, January 2020 to March 2020. The COVID-19 Pandemic created an emergency all around the world. The two interns from Fraser Valley University in Vancouver, Canada, had to rush back.

Andrea is deeply involved and committed to the social cause. Her visit to India was to study and practice Yoga Abhyas in Rishikesh and Kerala. She paid a 5-day visit to DIR to meet the staff and the families living in Janta Colony. During her stay, she went for a fieldwork, clicked pictures, and worked on our Website. Andrea is a devoted soul and passionate about working for needy families.

- The progress report of the sponsored children, which includes the health status of the adopted child, is sent to each donor every month.
- A total of 16 children of the project Alambana (children of rag pickers) are sponsored. These children are also part of the NIPP program.

DETAILED PROGRESS REPORT OF NIPP:

- Total attendance for January was 29, including Alambana children, Pregnant and lactating mothers.
- In this, 10 children were below 5 years of age, 2 were needy, malnourished Lactating mothers, 1 was an underprivileged and malnourished woman of Janta Colony, and 16 children were under the Alambana Project.

PROGRESS REPORT UNDER NIPP PROGRAM:

- 5 children gained weight.
- 5 children showed no change in weight due to seasonal illnesses like cough and cold.



MEDICAL ATTENDANT PROGRAM

GENERAL DUTY ASSISTANT

- In collaboration with the **Tech Mahindra Foundation, DIR India** launched a three-month **General Duty Assistant (GDA) / Medical Attendant course** for boys and girls from the basti on December 17th. Health promoters from DIR India also enrolled in the program,







- Class - **Pre-Nursery**
- Class teacher - **Mrs. Preeti**
- Name of the student - **Daksh** is a student enrolled in a pre-nursery class and began his education in September. Initially, he displayed introverted behaviour, avoiding interactions with his peers and largely refraining from participating in school activities. Upon noticing this, his class teacher implemented a strategy to provide him with additional support and introduced a variety of engaging activities for all the students. Thanks to the teacher's proactive approach, Daksh has shown remarkable improvement and now actively participates in all school-related activities.



- Class - **Nursery**
- Class teacher - **Mrs. Geeta**
- Name of the student - **Viraj** is a nursery class student who faces unique challenges but also possesses special strengths. In the early days of joining the school, he struggled to sit properly in class and did not engage with others. Additionally, he often did not communicate his need to use the washroom, which resulted in accidents. However, with the guidance and support of his class teacher, there has been a remarkable change in him. Now, he sits properly during lessons and confidently recites poems in front of the class. He also asks for permission from his teacher before eating or using the washroom.



SWAD SCHOOL PROGRESS REPORT

- Class - **L.K.G**
- Class teacher - **Mrs. Lata**
- Name of the student - **Vanshika** is a dedicated student in L.K.G. She demonstrates exceptional abilities in oral studies, grasping and articulating concepts with clarity. However, she faces significant challenges with written tasks. She often takes a long time to complete her classwork and struggles with structuring her writing properly, despite her quick learning abilities. Recognizing her difficulties, her class teacher implemented a strategy to enhance her writing skills by assigning additional classwork and homework for consistent practice. Through perseverance and dedicated effort, Vanshika has gradually improved and made noticeable progress in her writing abilities over time.



- Class - **U.K.G**
- Class teacher - **Mrs. Saroj**
- Name of the student - **Shivangi** is a motivated student with a good understanding of the alphabet and phonetics. Initially, she struggled with spelling and sentence structure in English. To help her, the teacher used visual aids like pictures and flashcards, often introducing new words along with simple sentences like "This is a car." This approach made it easier for Shivangi to learn new vocabulary and greatly improved her language skills.

- Class teacher - **Miss Antima**
- Name of the student - **Mahi**, a student in the Alambana class, joined in October 2024. Initially, she was extremely shy and preferred to remain silent, rarely conversing with her classmates. Her reserved nature made it difficult for her to interact with others or express herself in class. Noticing this, her teacher encouraged her to communicate more and to recite poems in class daily. With consistent support, Mahi gradually improved her behaviour. She began talking to her classmates and participating more actively in class. Now, she confidently recites poems and interacts freely, demonstrating remarkable growth in her confidence and communication skills.

The children participated in an origami activity where they made a caterpillar and added colours to it.







- On 16th January, DIR India board President sponsored lunch for DIR staff and NIPP children on occasion of her husband's death anniversary.


