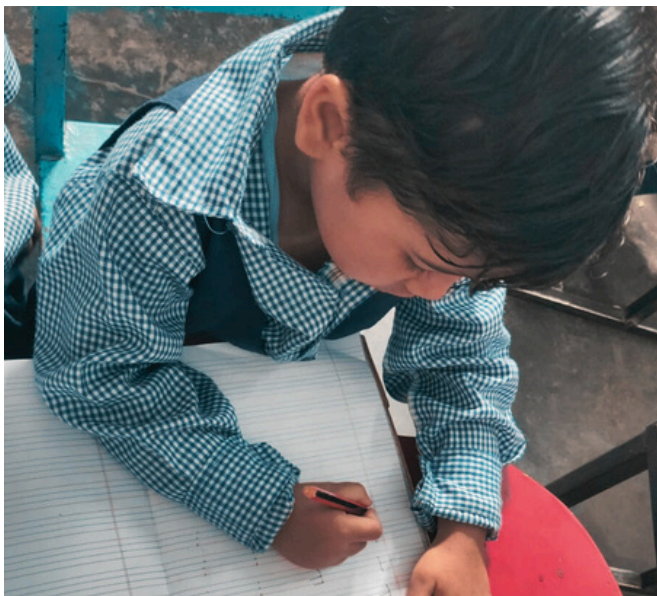
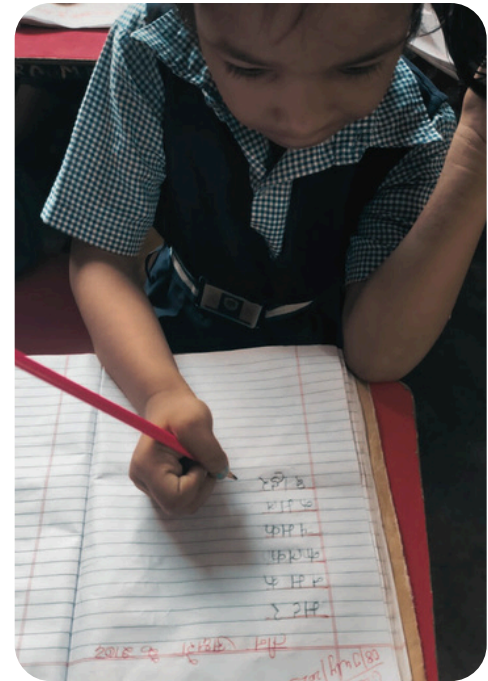
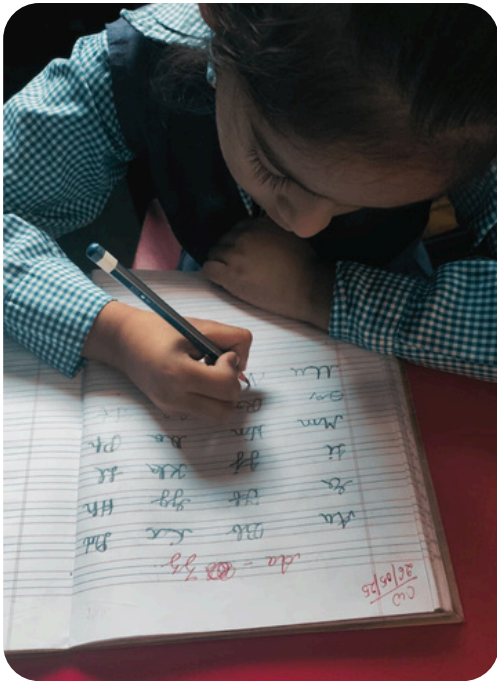

ACADEMICS

MEDICAL

April marks the onset of summer with warming days, blooming trees, and the commencement of harvest activities. During the academic session, the study of the human cell and its organelles was conducted, focusing on the structure, function and the key components of the cell, which play vital roles in maintaining the cellular function of our body.

On the other hand, the health promoters took the General Duty Assistant classes, in which they facilitated revision sessions to reinforce essential healthcare practices. The topics included were:

- **Infection Control:** This section emphasises the types of infectious agents, such as viruses, bacteria, fungi, and parasites, and how they spread.
- **Functions of GDA:** Discussed the roles and responsibilities of a GDA, such as helping patients and supporting nurses and doctors.
- **Hand Washing:** The correct medical hand hygiene protocols were taught, which included 7 steps of hand washing, as per WHO guidelines. Proper hand hygiene is very important in stopping the spread of germs in healthcare settings.



ACADEMICS

NUTRITION

Nutrition plays a vital role in the healthy growth and development of children. It significantly impacts their physical well-being, mental health, and academic performance. A balanced diet provides the essential nutrients required to maintain a healthy weight, develop strong bones and teeth, support cognitive function, and strengthen the immune system.

However, a deficiency in diet can lead to malnutrition, which adversely affects a child's overall health and development. Recognising the importance of proper nutrition, the following topics were covered during the nutrition training in the month of April:

DETAILED PROGRESS REPORT OF NIPP:

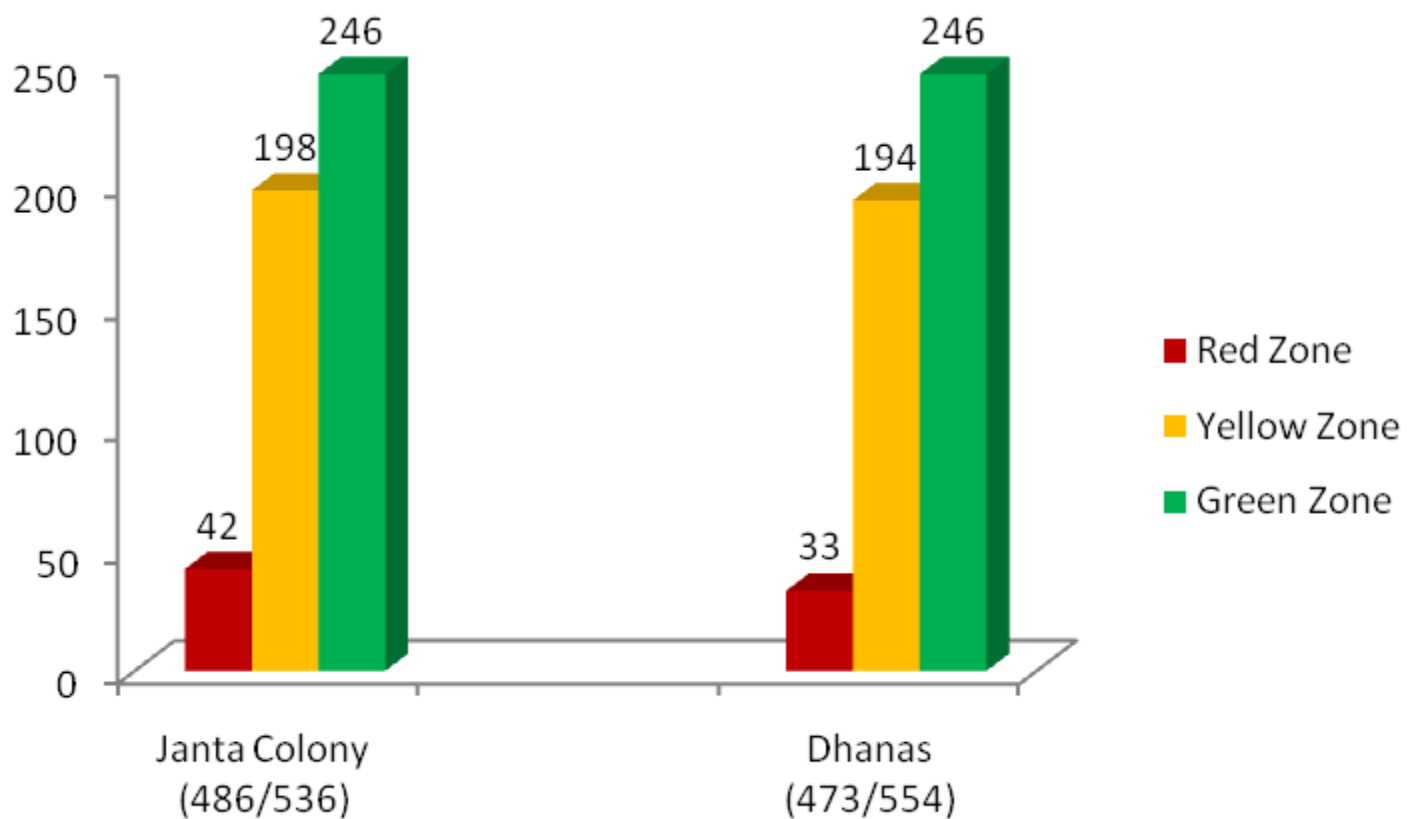
- Total attendance for April was 31, including Alambana children, pregnant and lactating mothers.
- In this, 8 children were below 5 years of age, 2 were needy, malnourished Lactating mothers, 1 was an underprivileged and malnourished woman of Janta Colony, and 20 children were under the Alambana Project.
- **PROGRESS REPORT UNDER NIPP PROGRAM:**
- 5 children showed no change in weight, and 3 children lost weight due to seasonal illnesses like cough and cold.



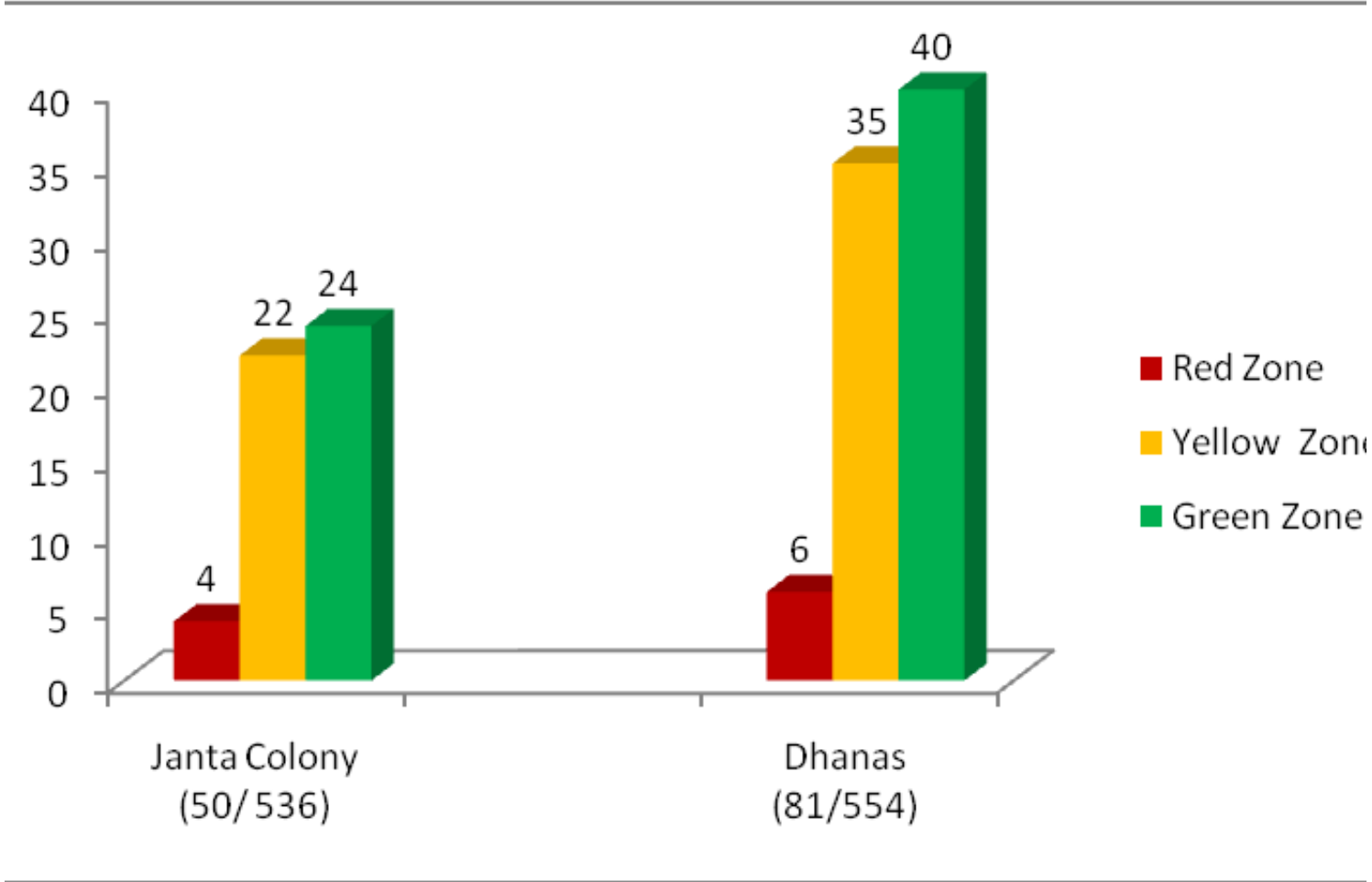

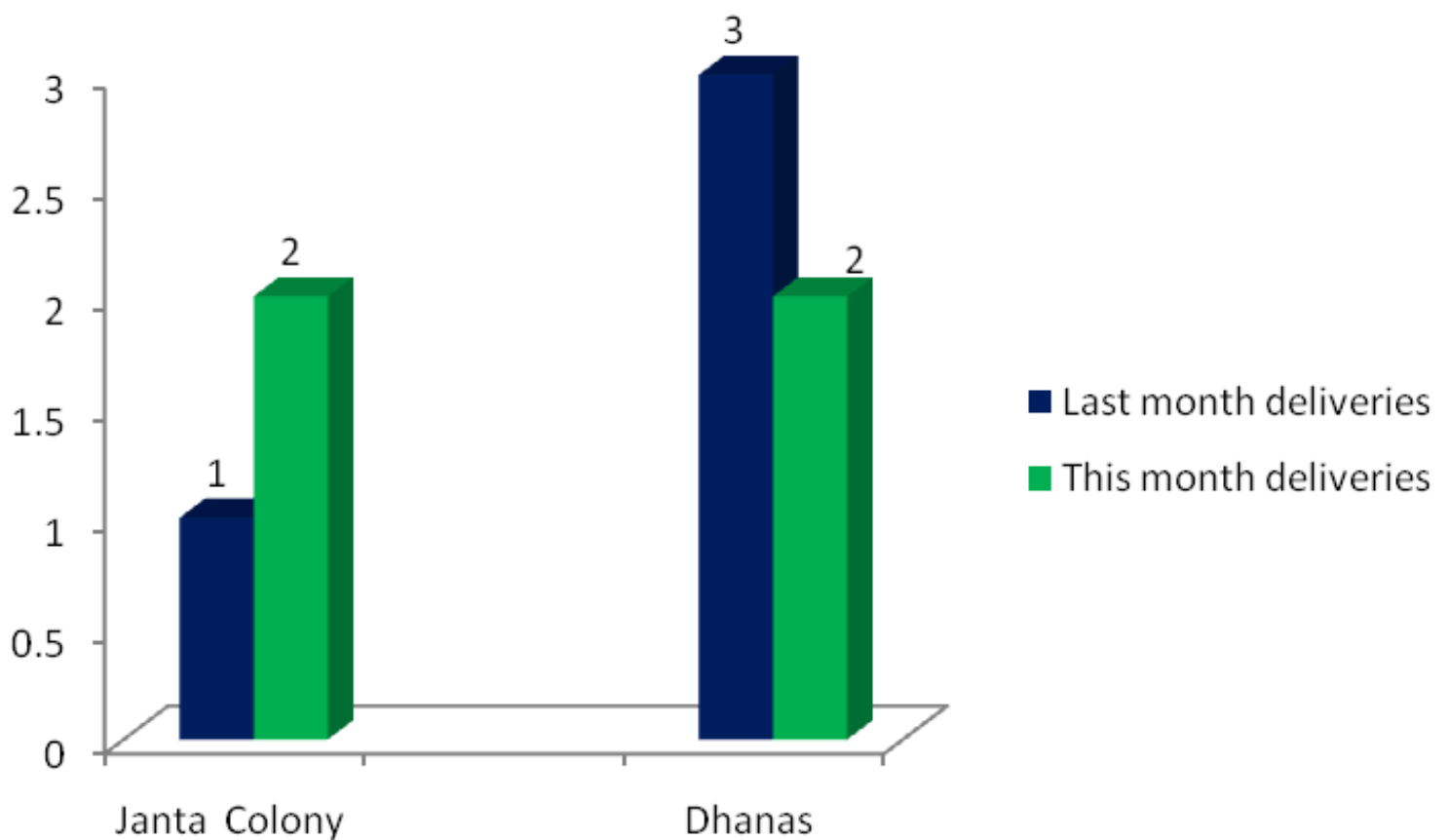

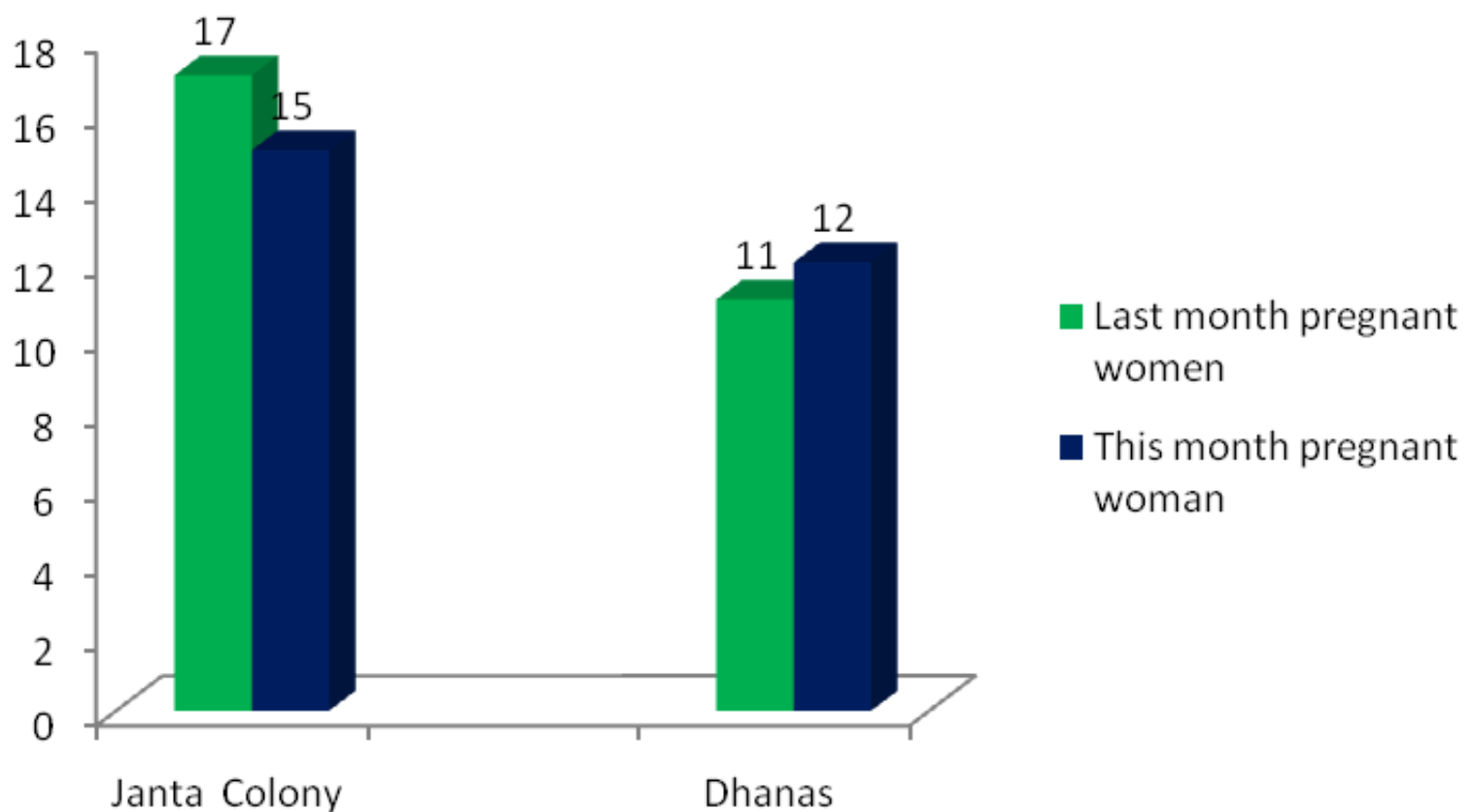

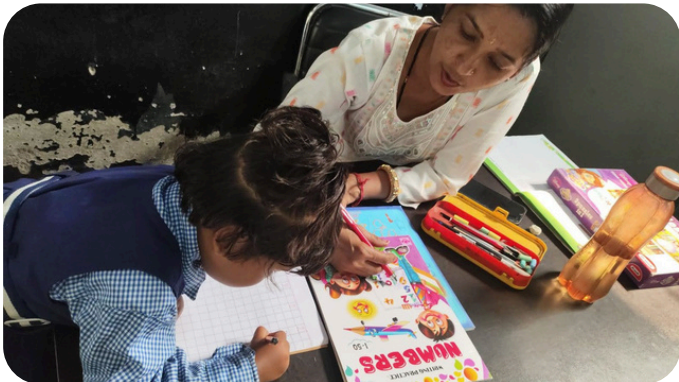
- Class - Alambana

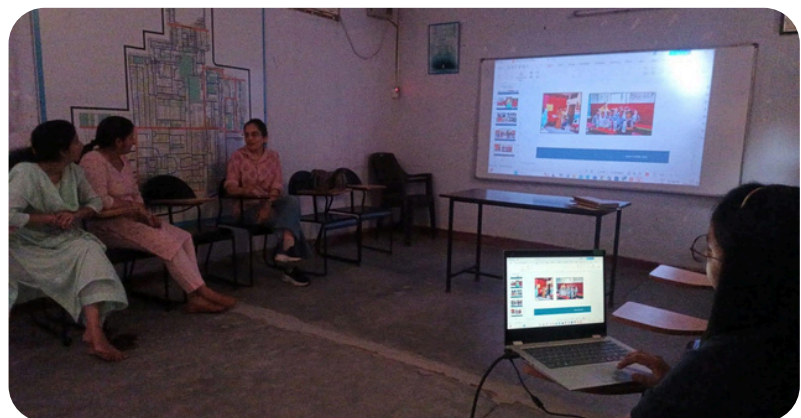

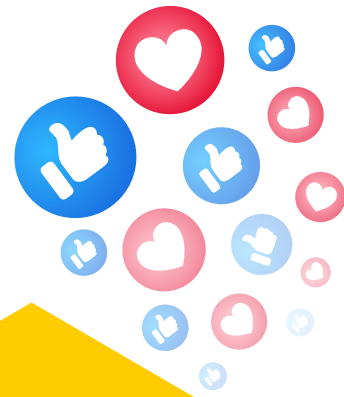
