CEO REPORT

The medical team surveyed Janta Colony and Dhanas to assess the impact of our field worker committee meetings on awareness of family planning, plus practical implementation. The graphic display underneath is self-explanatory. DIR's medical project in Janta Colony has been running since 2006. The impact of Family planning is visible, whereas the Dhanas Project was adopted in January 2024, the impact of family planning will be seen after 2 years. We were pleased to see the statistics, as the majority of families have one or two children, unlike Janta Colony slums in 2006.

CEO REPORT

The weather was pleasant in November, but it was strange to see cases of Dengue both in Janta Colony and Dhanas. There were two deaths due to dengue in the Janta colony. A four-year-old child and a 40- 40-year-old male. Both of these cases were hospitalised in PGI as the platelet count dropped beyond the danger levels, and internal haemorrhages and bleeding killed them to death.

The medical team keeps holding committee meetings on seasonal diseases, sharing knowledge and preventive measures against the ailment. Pneumonia and Typhoid are common ailments during this season. Pneumonia is mostly seen in old people and small children. The DIR Medical team helps and guides the public with preventive measures in all the above mentioned diseases.





NUTRITION IMPROVEMENT PRIORITY PROGRAM:



The goal of our Nutritional Improvement Priority Program (NIPP) is to improve the
health status of those children who fall into the red-zone weight category (more
than 3 kg underweight) and underweight pregnant women from underprivileged
communities. Children under the ALAMBANA project are also included in the NIPP
program. They are served with toasts with boiled eggs and bananas for breakfast
and a NIPP meal for lunch along with other children sponsored under NIPP
program.

• These children are fed high-calorie, high-protein lunches in the DIR office under direct supervision every afternoon from Monday to Friday. Dietitians write menus consisting of items such as: milk, boiled eggs, rajma, bananas, rice and varieties of lentils, sweet dishes like rice porridge, custard, sooji porridge, cracked wheat grains porridge etc and varieties of raita etc. The menu is flexible and is completely dependent on the donations DIR-I receive.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS:



We have worked on the committee meetings held by the HPs in their assigned zones on the specific needs of the community each month. We have also specified committee meetings according to death statistics each month, for example we noticed deaths from common diseases such as asthma and diabetes, so the HPs taught their respective communities on early intervention and proper treatment of these illnesses. The HPs taught mothers on proper breastfeeding techniques in order to avoid further preventable deaths.







A Year's Overview

NUTRITIONAL DEMONSTRATIONS:



Every third Tuesday of the month, DIR India's Dietitians conduct a demonstration class for Health promoters and the Slum community on Low-cost High-Calorie High Protein Diet.

DIR Nutritionists demonstrate to the HPs a recipe for a nutritious meal that can be made with ingredients available in the basti. In turn, HPs give cooking classes in their assigned zones to teach the mothers.

The program is very popular and parents recognize the link to healthier growth on their children's weight charts.

The demonstrations for this year consisted of following recipes:

INCOME GENERATION PROGRAM:



The main goal of our income generation program is to empower women to become financially independent so that she can fulfill her personal needs and can raise the socio-economic status of her family. By providing vocational training to girls and women, DIR increases their chances of employability and self-employment.

Despite being a bustling town of some 16,000 residents, Janta Colony offers few opportunities to earn a living – particularly for women. After working in the community for a short time, DIR became aware that many women leave before dawn to work as house cleaners or street vendors in Chandigarh. Often, they don't return until late in the evening. In the meantime, they leave their



eldest child to care for younger siblings. The impact of this quickly became clear: HPs noted very little weight gain among children in households where mothers were absent most of the day. To address this issue, DIR sought to create cottage industries that would allow basti women to make a fair wage while working flexible hours at home. This would allow them to spend more time with their families and better benefit from DIR's services, such as cooking classes. With donated sewing machines and samples supplied by fabric and upholstery stores, DIR launched stitching classes in 2010. When women begin to earn an income, it elevates their status and decision-making authority in the family and in the community. It is also clear that women direct the majority of their income to better nourishment and education for their children. Enabling these "work at home" opportunities was a gamechanger for many families:children who had previously been chronically malnourished began to gain weight more quickly and were less burdened with caring for their siblings.

HOMEOPATHIC CAMP

COMPUTER AND DATA (ENTRY CLASSES:



Our health promoters are now skilled in computer operations, enabling them to store growth chart data digitally for accurate record-keeping and research purposes.

- Currently, all records for children under five, pregnant mothers, and NIPP kids are systematically maintained in dedicated folders. Our data entry operator conducts regular computer classes and supervises each health promoter's work. The data is securely stored on USB drives and uploaded daily to our Google Drive by senior staff.
- In addition, we have established computer classes for women seeking to acquire new skills and re-enter the workforce. Recognizing the importance of technology today, we offer affordable basic and advanced computer training to underprivileged teenagers, helping them strengthen their resumes.
- While we have set up infrastructure for computer classes specifically for children from basti communities, many face financial barriers. The monthly fee is Rs 500 per child, and we are actively seeking sponsorships to support these eager learners. Word-of-mouth publicity has spread awareness, and we have a list of basti girls keen to develop computer skills but limited by financial constraints.
- Our training program maintains excellent standards, providing individual attention to every child. We appeal to donors to support this initiative, empowering underprivileged girls with computer skills that will improve their job prospects in shops and stores around Chandigarh.




